GSI now routine at the University of Alabama at Birmingham



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Introduction

The University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB), an institution at the forefront of clinical care, is now routinely using Gemstone Spectral Imaging (GSI) to make clinical decisions. Patients are scanned with GSI protocols and post-processing is done with GSI Viewer on a regular basis to follow hepatocellular lesions.

This case study highlights one such day of routine GSI scanning at UAB. Seven patients (four male, three female), with histories of hepatocellular lesions, were scanned using the GSI scan mode. The clinical goal was to monitor the extent of disease progression and/or treatment response within identified lesions. "At UAB we are now routinely using GSI to help our patients by incorporating dual energy CT details along with conventional anatomic CT measures to aid us in our assessment of disease progression and treatment response."

Detailed Case Study

1 Patient history

An 81-year-old female with a history of ruptured hepatocellular carcinoma and recurrence of multifocal hepatocellular carcinoma. The patient was treated with transarterial chemoembolization (TACE) and a multiphasic hepatic CT exam using GSI was performed to assess treatment response and extent of residual tumor post TACE.

Advantage of application

Selecting the appropriate keV level, in this case 55 keV, from the 101 available monochromatic levels (ranging from 40–140 keV) is important for optimizing lesion conspicuity and for aiding in our assessment of the extent of residual disease. Additionally, having the ability to dial down energy levels that maximize contrast is a useful tool especially if we encounter an exam with a low level of contrast enhancement.

With the introduction of GSI Viewer 3D, intuitive one-click lesion segmentation on a lower keV monochromatic image (55 keV image in this case) is possible. The selected volumetric ROI can be interrogated easily for material quantification, iodine content, and/or spectral curve analysis, in addition to conventional CT measures, volume, axis, and HU measures.

Discussion and conclusion

We use GSI on a regular basis to provide us additional information for assessment, detection, and therapy response. GSI provides the benefit of spectral information and material quantification in addition to improved contrast visualization aiding in our diagnostic confidence. With the introduction of the new GSI Viewer 3D, we benefit from workflow improvements.

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess treatment response post TACE.

Discussion

Using GSI Viewer, the lesion conspicuity was improved at 52 keV and helped to demonstrate tumor thrombus in the anterior segmental branch of the right portal vein.

3 Patient history

A 63-year-old male with hepatocellular carcinoma

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess treatment response post TACE

Discussion

Using GSI Viewer, the image conspicuity was improved at 52 keV and the iodine image aided in the assessment of the extent of residual disease around the treated lesion in segment 6, as well as other sites in the liver.

4 Patient history

A 66-year-old male with cirrhosis

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess disease progression.

Discussion:

Using GSI Viewer, the image conspicuity was improved at 52 keV and aided in the assessment of the extent of hepatocellular carcinoma.

5 Patient history

A 61-year-old male with cirrhosis.

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess disease progression.

Discussion

The material density iodine image on the GSI viewer helped us confirm the absence of enhancement; the non-enhancing lesions are thought to represent benign von Meyenberg complexes. In this case, GSI was especially useful to evaluate small lesions that may be difficult to characterize as often seen incidentally on CT.

6 Patient history

A 59-year-old female with cirrhosis

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess disease progression in presence of TIPS. GSI images were used to analyze TIPS patency.

Discussion

As part of GSI Viewer 3D, a two-click AVA, a Volume Viewer tool, was used for vessel tracking. In this case, the material density iodine image of the tracked vessel shows enhancement within the vessel proving TIPS patency.

7 Patient history

A 54-year-old female with cirrhosis

Clinical indication

Multi-phasic CT was performed to assess disease progression.

Discussion

GSI Viewer was used to help us analyze a hypodense lesion in the right kidney that had minimal interval growth but both spectral images and material density iodine image confirmed enhancement.
